Area 6 Definition: A systematic study of the way historians and other scholars interpret the past through documents, artifacts, and/or other primary source materials to understand the past and the present in historical context.

Area 6 Goals: To encourage students' understanding of and critical thinking about major events, ideas, institutions, personalities, and changes of the past, by developing their ability to evaluate traditional and online sources, form an interpretation based on these materials, and communicate their ideas and conclusions orally and in writing.

Using the Gen Ed skill objectives defined by the UCC, Area 6 faculty wrote the following Student Learning Objectives for all courses in the area in the December 2008 faculty workshop. Area 6 faculty also approved these in the December 2009 workshop.

Overall Student Learning Objectives for Area 6:

- 1. Students will learn to locate sources, both printed and online, which are appropriate to college-level assignments.
- 2. Students will learn to distinguish between primary and secondary sources and between facts and opinions.
- 3. Students will learn correct citation methods and will be able to distinguish between plagiarism and proper documentation.
- 4. Students will learn how to form a historical interpretation by integrating information about the past with themes explored in the course and with their own personal experience. They will also learn how to engage with contrasting scholarly interpretations of the past.
- 5. Students will develop specific skills associated with "critical thinking" (e.g., to compare and contrast, to argue against one's own opinion, and to recognize connections and explain relationships among different texts).
