

CAMPUS DIRECTIONS

Baruch College:

Baruch College campus is located in the Lexington Avenue/23rd Street area in Manhattan and is accessible via the 6 train to 23 Street & Park Avenue South or the N, R, or W trains to 23 Street & Broadway.

Graduate Center:

The CUNY Graduate Center is located on Fifth Avenue between 34th and 35th Streets. It is easily accessed via the B, D, F, N, R, & Q trains at Avenue of the Americas and 34th Street or the 6 train at Park Avenue South and 33rd Street. Graduate Center is two blocks east of Penn Station.

Lehman College:

Lehman College is located at 250 Bedford Park Boulevard West and is accessible via the 4 or D train to Bedford Park Boulevard. By car, the Van Cortlandt Park South exit off the Major Deegan Expressway (I-87) or the Mosholu Parkway exit off the Bronx River Parkway or the Saw Mill (Henry Hudson) are recommended.

Queens College:

Queens College is located at 65-30 Kissena Boulevard and is accessible via the E or F train to Forest Hills/71st Ave Station, followed by the Q65A bus. By car, take Exit 24 (Kissena Blvd.) off the Long Island Expressway.
