### Finding Articles

- From the library homepage, click on "Electronic Databases" or "Find Articles" to search a wealth of databases indexing published articles. Below is a selected list of e-resources to use for your research.
  - **IMPORTANT:** Some of the databases include the full-text of the articles. If you don't see an indication of full-text click on the  **Find it!** option to locate a journal article electronically or print. If you are not successful try searching Find Electronic Journals by Title and/or the Find Books & Journal Titles in the Catalog from the library homepage. See handout on finding journals for more information.
  - You can access these databases off-campus (at home). You must first register your ID card at the Circulation Desk (1<sup>st</sup> floor). Select the database you wish to search. You will be prompted to type in your library number located on the front of your ID card.

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# Finding Books

1. Click on Find Books & Journal Titles in the Catalog from the homepage
2. The catalog will default to Lehman College if you access it on campus. When you access the catalog from home, click on "Select Individual CUNY Libraries" to select Lehman.
3. You have two search options Keyword or Browse
  - a. Keyword (Use this option to search for two or three terms. For more advanced searching use GUIDED SEARCH)
    - i. Use AND to narrow your search
      1. Example - narcotics AND laws
    - ii. Use OR to broaden a search
      1. Example - narcotics OR drugs
    - iii. Use \* (asterisk) or ? (Question mark) to truncate a term
      1. Example - politic\* (searches for politics, political, politician)
  - b. Browse (Use this search option if you know what you are looking for)
    - i. Title - If a title begins with A, AN, or THE leave it out and begin with the next word
      1. Example - Crack, powder cocaine, and heroin
    - ii. Author - Search last name first
      1. Example - Okihiro, Gary
    - iii. Subject - Searching for information about someone or a general topic
      1. Example - drug traffic

## SEARCHING for BOOKS

### KEYWORD SEARCHING

Use to search for broad terms.  
Examples:  
Minorities and politic\*  
Hispanic\* and education

### BROWSE SEARCHING

**TITLE** to search for a title of a book or journal  
Examples:  
Color of Water  
Race and Ethnic Relations

**AUTHOR** to search for books written by the author  
Example: Hemingway Ernest

**SUBJECT** to search for books about a person  
Example: Powell Adam Clayton

### Physician Substance Abuse and Recovery What Does It Mean for Physicians—and Everyone Else?

**T**HE 10% TO 15% PREVALENCE OF SUBSTANCE USE DISORDERS among physicians is similar to that in the general population,<sup>1,2</sup> but the quality and intensity of treatment given to physicians may far exceed that available to other individuals with these disorders.<sup>3,4</sup> Recognition of the impaired physician began to emerge only in the 1990s<sup>5</sup> and has led to the development of physician health programs (PHPs). These are new treatment models, available in many states, usually through medical societies, as an alternative to monitoring by state government boards of registration in medicine.<sup>6</sup> In many cases, physicians who voluntarily contract with a PHP may remain anonymous<sup>7</sup> to the state medical board and the National Practitioner Data Bank, a feature designed to promote early intervention in the disease process, ie, before patients are harmed. Many PHPs now offer services to other health professionals also. Treatment in these programs is probably the most comprehensive.
