SEMINAR DESCRIPTION

The Graduate Advantage Program (GAP) is designed for students who have at least 45 credits by the start of the semester and will graduate from BMCC by the end of the semester. Students will prepare to thrive after graduation and transfer by defining and practicing transfer survival strategies, like active research, self-advocacy, help-seeking, and connecting to campus. Students who fully participate and attend at least eleven of the twelve virtual seminars will receive Co-Curricular Transcript Credit and a BLA tuition micro-grant. Micro-grant amounts will be based on end-of-semester funding sources, and eligible students will be notified distribution details in May.

SEMINAR OBJECTIVES

- 1. Deliberately and strategically prepare to be a transfer student by practicing at BMCC and at four-year campuses
- 2. Practice being an active student who asks questions and researches and factchecks answers
- Understand and practice the elements of self-advocacy in context of being a transfer student
- 4. Explore the importance of help-seeking and the consequences of isolating on campus
- 5. Understand importance of finding and connecting to positive influences at the transfer campus
